Opportunity Class Placement 2023

I would like to update you on the modified timeline for Year 5 opportunity class entry in 2023.

The Opportunity Class Placement Test was conducted on Thursday 28 July 2022 in **1056** test centres across NSW.

The results are expected to be released to parents and schools in **late October 2022**.

Parents have been advised that as soon as the placement outcome information is prepared, they will receive an email asking them to login to their application dashboard to view their child's outcome.

Key dates to be aware of for remaining stage of the OC process:

Late October 2022 – Placement outcome information is sent to parents and schools. Parents with offers must respond within two weeks.

From late October 2022 – Parents accept or decline offers. Offers made from the reserve list.

27 January 2023 – At 5pm, students with accepted offers are withdrawn from the reserve list.

Uncle Laurie Visit

On Monday 8th August students participated in an incursion led by local Aboriginal Elder Uncle Laurie. Uncle Laurie is extremely passionate about sharing his culture with others and assisting to broaden people's understanding of Aboriginal culture and the Guringai peoples. The incursion Uncle Laurie began with sharing Acknowledgement of Country and a smoking ceremony. Students then had a lesson in boomerang throwing and an opportunity to try out their own skills. A variety of Aboriginal artefacts were shared with the students and Uncle Laurie shared about the artefact's history and purpose. The incursion concluded with all students collaborating with Uncle Laurie to create a sandstone carving of a stingray, the totem for our local area. This carving can now be viewed in the bush tucker garden by the yarning circle (the fish). A great time was had by all and we are very grateful to Uncle Laurie for sharing his knowledge, passion and time with us.







STEAM Classes

Students have been participating in a variety of lessons, providing a wonderful introduction to coding. Kindergarten and Year 1 has been working with Indies, exploring and investigating how these small robots move and respond to different commands. Stage 2 and Stage 3 have been working with Ozobots, exploring and investigating how they respond to colour. Stage 3 is now beginning to use computers to code and control the robots. It has been a wonderful opportunity for the students, and we are looking forward to continuing this program in Term 4.

3/2/1B students have had some exciting Maths lessons recently.

We have been learning to predict and measure capacity and volume of different containers. We spent a sunny afternoon in the sandpit experimenting with, and comparing different sized cylinders by filling them with sand. We had to work out if the first cylinder had a greater or lesser capacity than the second cylinder. Students really enjoyed the time in the sun and exploring being a mathematician in an outside

environment.










We have also been exploring how to partition tricky shapes by splitting them into smaller shapes and playing the Hexagon Hopper game together. We have been learning to identify and label different 2D shapes and are beginning to look at different angles.
